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A speculative reflection inspired by Barbara Flanagan's "Letter to My Son"

What are the key dates in this fictional work?

However, her social and political predictions are less feasible because institutional and cultural systems are more difficult to change rapidly than technological infrastructure. The consequences of these developments are complex. While technological progress increases efficiency, enhances connectivity, and improves the environment, it also raises concerns about

surveillance, data control, and individual rights. Overall, the letter reflects Flanagan's keen but uneven foresight, highlighting both its potential to predict long-term social change and its limitations.

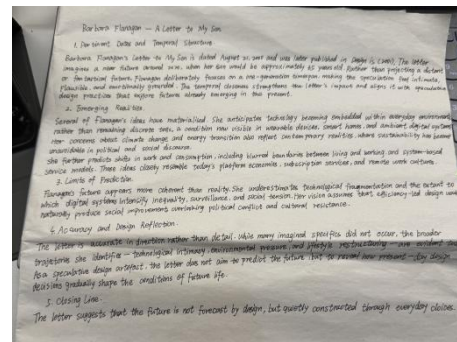
Key Observations on 'Letter to My Son'

1. Focusing on infrastructure (energy, transport, governance) rather than individual devices. 2. Blending optimism with caution, without offering definitive moral conclusions. 3. Many predictions employ exaggeration to reveal present anxieties. 4. The future depicted appears mundane rather than spectacular.

By envisioning the near future through personal narrative, it reveals how design, over time, not only shapes objects and systems but also reshapes values, behavioural patterns, and cognitive expectations.
